Internship Program Highlights:

- Brevard College's Top ECE and Education students recommended by their instructors. Student alumni and other majors also considered.
- WCCA Hiring process, 16-hour Orientation + 30 hours training
- > \$13.00/hour pay up to 29 hours per week
- Interns work at WCCA's Hillview Children's Center and other Henderson County childcare facilities
- Integrated into WCCA Center family and staff
 - Paired with teaching teams
 - Receive in-class observations and reflective supervision
 - Participate in professional development
 - Included in monthly staff meetings
- > 5 Interns recruited



Lessons Learned:

- ✓ Interns reported the experience increased their interest in early childhood education and chosen career path
- ✓ Different age groups come with different responsibilities and teaching approaches
- ✓ Interns are gaining confidence in working with peers, children and families
- ✓ These internships are providing valuable life lessons about being dependable/reliable, on-time, responsible, and maintaining confidentiality with child/family info
