PROGRAM DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Head Start/Early Head Start/NC Pre-K – Henderson, Polk & Transylvania Counties Linda Carter, Director of Children's Services, August 2021

Covid Updates: Losses in our CACFP (Food program) were much higher in 2020-2021 during Covid due to only being able to receive meal reimbursement for children in attendance. Covid and Head Start grant funding fortunately covered most of the losses (\$207,697, total loss without funding would have been \$214,000). For 2021-2022, an agreement has been signed with HCPS for the delivery of breakfasts and lunches for Henderson County sites for the year. HCPS will provide free meals for Henderson County enrolled children through their federal program. WCCA will continue to buy snacks, infant formula and baby food through our CACFP program and purchase teacher meals from HCPS. Cooks at Sugar Hill and King Creek Centers were informed of this decision on August 10th. They were encouraged to apply for open WCCA jobs or for several open food service positions with HCPS. As of 8/25, we still need to hire 29 Children's Services staff, not including another 28 staff for sites under renovation and yet to open. Nine Classrooms did not open due to either no staff or no enrollment. Three classrooms were impacted by Covid exposure during the month.

Facilities Update: Peacock Architects sent drawings for the Tebeau property out for work quotes on July 20th but failed to include the civil site plans, resulting in a delay in receiving work quotes to August 30th. Work quotes for the Forest City property were received 8/26 and are under review. Sunny View EHS classrooms: the licensing application was submitted 7/27/2021 however, the Licensing Consultant for Polk County will not visit until September 1st, delaying the opening. WCCA will be following Polk County Public Schools policy of not allowing families in the Sunny View Elementary building this fall.

Head Start/NC Pre-k Update: Staff returned August 13th for Pre-service training. Open house events occurred on August 23rd and 24th at all locations. Open Houses were mostly held outside with staff and guests required to wear masks. Staff have expressed that they feel prepared for the new year and are looking forward to being with children while still maintaining all health and safety guidelines.

The 21-22 Program Year Family Handbook was revised and distributed to staff and families. Spanish translation is currently being completed. Updates included wording on safe and appropriate clothing / accessories for young children attending our centers, the WCCA Outdoor Learning Environment Position Statement, updates to Support Services procedures and general health and safety guidelines.

DCDEE announced that statewide NC Pre-K programs will be expected to participate in a new literacy training program. LETRS® for Early Childhood Educators is a professional learning experience for PreK–K teachers presented as a blended model integrating online, print, and face-to-face interactive sessions. It will provide a deep knowledge of early literacy instruction and aid teachers in gaining new skills to help young learners build a foundation. The ultimate goal is to empower teachers to apply best practice strategies to guide children's learning. Training will help teachers understand the development of oral language, print knowledge, alphabet learning, and writing skills as well as provide the "why" and "how" of early literacy instruction across all domains. Transylvania and Henderson Counties are in Cohort #2 with training starting January 2022.

Family Services Updates: Interviews continue for the Family Services Manager position, vacated the end of June. Recruitment and Volunteer Coordinator, Gina Dowd, will join the team in early September and already has a long "to do" list. The ERSEA team continues to process incoming applications for the 2021-2022 school year. Family Advocates received training on 8/27 in the Parent, Family and Community Engagement procedures. Site supervisors will receive the training in September.

Program Support Services: Teachers participated in multiple days of pre-service training with a "We are Superheroes" theme, and are ready for the new program year and to use their Superpowers in the classrooms! The Pre-service training week was originally planned to be held at Bonclarken Conference Center, but changed to virtual training due to the uptick of Covid infections. Special thanks to **Kim Wilson** for her very thorough and highly informative training on child abuse and neglect for the Children's Services staff!

This program year we are implementing more aspects of the Creative Curriculum to help our staff reach implementation fidelity. All of our teaching staff will have access to digital resources including multiple different studies to use in classrooms with our 2's and preschoolers. They will also be able to utilize online training in conjunction with their coaching. Families will also have access to curriculum through a Family App that provides guided learning experiences, learning games, and more. Parent Educators have been trained in using Parents as Teachers and are working with coaches to support their implementation of this new curriculum.

Support is being provided daily to teaching staff and supervisors to ensure that consents are received, screenings are happening, and assistance is provided to teachers and families for children with unique health, developmental, and/or behavioral needs.

This fall we are continuing our partnership with Bearwallow Farms and ASAP. A dietetic intern from the farm will be bringing produce bags (provided by grant funds from ASAP) to our families and leading activities with the children. Our Parent Educators are planning farm visits to the farm with a grant from ASAP as well.

EHS & Childcare Partnership Updates: The CCP partners have been busy managing COVID and some flooding. Kids Kingdom was closed for two weeks in August as a result of COVID and are still working to build their staffing for the 2021-2022 Program Year. The Rosman community was hit hard by the recent rains, and the staff at Little Blessings are working hard to support families who lost homes and served as a shelter during the worst of the flood. All 5 CCP sites have mentors who are working to support new teachers, in the hope of retaining new staff members. Mentors have met monthly for the past four months in a Professional Learning Community and have received advanced training in Teaching Strategies Cloud, Child Plus and individualizing learning.

In EHS, we have been working to hire staff in order to fill open teaching positions. A new infant classroom funded with the recent Expansion Grant at Hillview should be licensed and ready to open once staff can be hired.

Data and Compliance: We've completed the 2020-2021 Program Information Report (PIR) for all three grants: Head Start, Early Head Start, Early Head Start Expansion & CCP. In completion of the PIR, we have identified some areas that need improvement and will be working with all staff on those improvements to ensure that we are able to capture all required PIR information. Work is in full swing on the annual CACFP application that is due on September 31st. The goal of the WCCA staff is to submit the CACFP application by September 15th. While many of WCCA's meals will be provided by Henderson County Public Schools, WCCA will maintain its CACFP status and will be able to claim reimbursement for snacks and infant meals.

Other Highlights: The **August 10th Job Fair at the Railroad Depot Brevard** resulted in 6 total applicants. The CS management team met August 12th to detail a **CDA Pipeline Program** for

nonemployees with significant progress made and continuing to get the program up and running. Children's Services is coordinating with the WCCA Facility Director, Tim Camp, to schedule site visits and walkthroughs for **Focus Area 2-(FA2) Federal Review preparations**. The FA2 committees have also begun meetings in preparation for the federal review visit this winter.
