Community Assessment Update April 2024

Changes Since January 2023

Demographics in Service Area:

- Total population in our service area has been fluctuating or increasing over the last 5 years
- Birth rate over the last year has been increasing
- There is a projected increase of 1,155 children under age five, from 2024 to 2028. 260 would be living below the poverty level and could be income-eligible for our program

Poverty Rates:

- Increased in all service area counties except for Henderson County over the last year
- In Transylvania County, the number/percent of Hispanic individuals below the poverty level increased from 66 individuals (6.1%) to 350 individuals (31.3%)
- For single mothers with young children who live in poverty, Transylvania County showed a 22.2% increase

Changes Continued

Education in Service Area:

- High school graduation rates decreased in all counties except for Rutherford County
- High school dropout rates decreased in all counties except for Transylvania County

Health in Service Area:

- Out of 100 counties in North Carolina, counties in the service area rank in the top 20% for health outcomes, with the exception of Rutherford County (72 out of 100)
- Vaping statistics, in terms of percentages, high school teen students in North Carolina (35.5%) vape more than in any other state, with the exception of West Virginia (35.7%)
- Data for North Carolina indicates that in the state in 2023, the number of suspected overdose deaths decreased by 10%. Highest rates for counties in our service area are Polk and Rutherford Counties.

Changes Continued

Health (Continued):

- Since last year, an additional 7,489 adults enrolled in Medicaid Expansion representing a range of 4.6% to 8.0% of adults in our counties
- Dental care continues to be a challenge for some residents, especially the youngest children
- The percentage of women who receive early prenatal care has increased in all our service area except for Transylvania County
- Percentage of low birth weight has decreased among all of our service area

Nutrition:

- Food insecurity rates are elevated
- WIC and SNAP: decrease in participation over last year

Changes Continued

Social and Economic Factors Impacting Well-being:

- Home values increased in service area
- Median rent and owner costs have also increased greatly over time in the service area
- Many households have difficulty affording rent or home ownership
- Cost of living increased

Labor Force, Industries, and Occupations:

- In our service area, the percentage of the population in the labor force is lower than the statewide rate
- Unemployment rates in service area are around the state average 3.1%

Children Experiencing Homelessness:

- Percentage of homeless children/youth enrolled in public schools has been fluctuating over the last
 5 years. In the last year, it has increased
- Point-in-time data for 2019-2023 indicates a fluctuating number of children in homeless families in the service area, with 44 children in 2023; 23 of which were from Henderson County.

Children Receiving Public Assistance:


• In the service area in 2022, 260 households received Work First benefits (TANF in NC) – the lowest number of participants in five years
